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

## Immigrant Populations in Houston:

As of 2014, the Census Bureau's American Community Survey<sup>[3]</sup> estimates, Houston's foreign-born population is at 28% (615,457 persons):



*Note: Latin America also includes Central, North and South Americas*

- Many recent immigrants are highly mobile, for example, because of language barriers, minimal formal education, and a lack of economic opportunities, families continue to relocate within the community.
- Youth are expected to contribute to household income; parents work multiple jobs and children lack adult supervision, which has a negative impact on youth of immigrant families.
- Parents also tend to be unaware of school policies and this has a negative effect on schools because the frequent relocation makes it difficult for them to keep records on students.
