Little Free Libraries/Libros Libres is a literacy and community design initiative in Dallas that uses free book exchanges to build community and promote a culture of reading. Part of the Little Free Library movement (www.littlefreelibrary.org), these small neighborhood book shelters operate under the guiding principle of “take a book, leave a book.” The project makes books available through a sustainable, low-resource, high-access model that supports the health of the neighborhoods by fostering collaboration and relationships.

Dallas residents work alongside artists and designers to plan, design, build and sustain Little Free Libraries, creating new outlets for accessing books that reflect their neighborhoods. The sustainability of the libraries depends on including and engaging neighbors and leaders within each community to work collaboratively to develop the project and steward the libraries when complete, promote habits of literacy locally, and support a culture of reading. The Dallas Public Library provides free books for each library for a year.
