Hurricane I ke Aid & Recovery Program Helps Fund New Million Dollar Greenhouse at Memorial Park

Original Greenhouse Damaged Beyond Repair by Hurricane Ike

Grand Opening Festivities & Tours will accompany the ribbon cutting ceremony for the new HPARD Greenhouse Complex at Memorial Park, on Friday, October 28, 2011. Festivities & tours are scheduled from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. with the ribbon cutting ceremony slated for 10:30 a.m. The new 8,600 square foot greenhouse replaces the original 3,000 square foot greenhouse that was damaged by Hurricane Ike in 2008.

WHY:	To celebrate the addition of an improved, expanded greenhouse to the operation of H.P.A.R.D.'s horticulture section

The greenhouse replaces the original 3,000 square foot greenhouse that was damaged beyond repair during Hurricane Ike. The project cost was \$1,445,727 of which \$288,147 was funded through the Hurricane Ike Aid and Recovery Program. Costs include design, construction, contingency, testing, and civic art. Amenities include: upgraded site utilities; construction of an outdoor education area with planting beds, seatwalls, a 10,000 gallon cistern for irrigation & detention; the installation of a new pre-fabricated restroom, new concrete driveways, gates & fencing; & modifications to existing headhouse & 2nd greenhouse that was not damaged by hurricane. General Contractor was Times Construction, Inc., Design Consultant Clark Condon Associates, Inc.
