



COVID-19 Virus Update


THREE METRICS TO GAUGE OUR PROGRESS



Rt measures how effective our collective behaviors (e.g., social distancing and mask wearing) are in slowing the growth of the virus. If R(t) is above 1.0, the virus spread is increasing; if R(t) is below 1.0, the virus spread is slowing.

Community Control: R(t) < 1.0 for 14-days

TMC TEXAS MEDICAL CENTER



When the number of new daily cases is over 200, it is difficult to effectively trace and help isolate further spread of the virus.

Community Control: < 200 cases/day for 14-days


Daily New Cases

(7 Day Average):

390







A low positivity rate may indicate declining spread of the virus.

Community Control: < 5% for 14-days

 - 48 hours for last week*
- 2,135 calls handled on COVID hotline.




*List City Run Test Sites

CRF Spending Requirements

Use of Funds Requirements:

- Necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to COVID-19.
- Were not part of a previously approved program (for the City, March 27, 2020); and
- Expenses that are incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020 and ends on December 30, 2020.

Spending Deadline:

- Programs and initiatives must utilize allocated CRF during the covered period ending December 30, 2020.
- Subrecipients of a grant or loan provided by the City using CRF must also use the funds by the end of the covered period.




CRF Allocation: Per Treasury (Federal) Categories

- Direct public health response captures majority of the spend.
- Short/medium term recovery/resilience programs are the remainder.
- Priorities always given to Health and those that need help the most.

Total Amount Approved: \$405.1 million






Key Takeaways

- Hard/disposable assets for immediate health response.
 - Vast number of new/enhanced services for an effective response
- Real-time, leading health advancement activities e.g. Wastewater studies.
- This spend category remains fluid as more is learned about the virus.

CRF \$48.2 million




Key Takeaways

- Enable virtual working when possible/effective.
 - Including addressing unintended threats: cyber breach
- Safer city facilities via enhanced screening & cleaning methods
 - Protection equipment for first responders to reduced person to person contact.
- More could be done in this category.

CRF \$54.2 million




Key Takeaways

- Small business grant program launched mid-August.
- Second round of rental assistance went live on 8/17.
- Cultural support program launched mid-August.
- Household digital access program is under development.





Project Performance Tracking



Key Takeaways

- 152 projects currently approved.
 - 139 in progress
 - 13 completed
- Projects in all stages of development.
- Approximately \$100M fully expended to date with significant funding committed.
- Bi-weekly performance tracking program in place.



Approved and Pending Programs

Programs Approved

- \$367K Translation and interpretation services
- \$508K HER Task Force Community Street Teams program.
- \$40K A/C trailers for outdoor temperature screening sites.
- \$460K Food and supplies for homeless emergency shelter.
- \$28K Saturday municipal court program.

Programs Pending

- HER Task Force non-student digital access program.
- Enhanced communications and messaging strategy for LatinX community.
- UV lighting disease containment program in City buildings.
