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### **COVID-19 Virus Update**

#### TMC KEY TAKEAWAYS FOR NOVEMBER 5, 2020

- Effective
  Reproduction
  Rate, R(t)
- R(t) for the Greater Houston Area (9-county MSA) is 1.011
  - This is above 1.0, which means the virus spread is increasing. Compared to:
  - Last week, R(t) was 1.13 for Greater Houston Area
- 2 Testing
- The current 7-day average COVID-19 testing positivity rate is 4.1% for TMC hospital systems. Compared to:
  - Last week<sup>3</sup>: 4.2%
  - Last month: 3.4%
- 3 New cases
- Yesterday, 661 new people<sup>2</sup> were reported as testing positive for COVID-19 in the Greater Houston Area. DSHS also released 104 older cases recently reported as of yesterday. Compared to:
  - Last week: 643 new cases/day
  - Last month: 394 new cases/day
- 4 Hospitalizations
- Yesterday, TMC admitted 117 new COVID-19 patients in TMC hospital institutions<sup>4</sup>. Compared to:
  - Last week: 102 hospitalizations/day
  - Last month: **76** hospitalizations/day
- 5 ICU capacity
- Yesterday, TMC's ICU Phase 1 (non-pandemic configurations) is 93% full, and TMC is not into Phase 2 plans for intensive care.

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
# Wastewater Sampling – An Early Indicator of Virus Prevalence

# **CRF Spending Requirements**

#### **Use of Funds Requirements:**


- Necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to COVID-19.
- Were not part of a previously approved program (for the City, March 27, 2020); and
- Expenses that are incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020 and ends on December 30, 2020.

#### **Spending Deadline:**


- Programs and initiatives must utilize allocated CRF during the covered period ending December 30, 2020.
- Subrecipients of a grant or loan provided by the City using CRF must also use the funds by the end of the covered period.

- Bi-weekly performance tracking program in place.



# **CRF Allocation: Per Treasury (Federal) Categories**



- 1,334 new contact case assignments per week
- ~2,000 COVID-19 hotline calls answered per day
- ~1.3 million meals to seniors, disabled, and isolated or quarantined individuals
- 1,103 individuals provided in-home testing




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# **Direct Community Support Programs**

- Vulnerable community focus








### **Rental Assistance Program**

- ~\$30 million in rental assistance
- 17,036 applicants approved

# **Financial Assistance Program**

The remaining unallocated funds (~\$20 million plus any remaining contingency) will go to direct community assistance.

- Identification of candidates via assistance criteria
- Anticipate over subscription and will use lottery system for selection
- Funds may be utilized to cover costs associated with:
  - Food access
  - Health Care
  - Childcare
  - Transportation
  - Other Necessary Expenses
