


Agreement Overview

- Modeled after the Memorial Park Agreement structure
- City, Harris County, and Buffalo Bayou Partnership (BBP) in coordination with Major Donor: The Kinder Foundation
- 30-year overall term with 10-year development phase for Projects
 - Two 30-year renewal options subject to City Council approval
- No change to Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) or General Fund
 - Leverage existing City projects, plans, and partnerships
 - Build on recent Council approvals for real estate transactions and CDBG-DR2017 funding
 - Future Council appropriations of existing CIP, real estate, CDBG-MIT, and Park Sector funding
 - Future Council actions related to TIRZs 18 (Fifth Ward) and 23 (Harrisburg); East River-Midway/HCID #23
- City and County making similar capital investment; annual maintenance and operations contributions to the Park Projects (generally: BBP 50%; City and County 25% each)
- Accelerates implementation of the Buffalo Bayou East Master Plan



BUFFALO BAYOU EAST COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT


- BBP has been working with the Greater East End and Fifth Ward communities for more than 20 years.
- As BBP developed the Master Plan from 2017 to 2019 and has begun designing individual projects since 2019, it has held major community meetings, numerous small gathering, focus groups, and virtual meetings in the Greater East End and Fifth Ward to get feedback from over 1000 residents.
- BBP staff regularly attends festivals, civic association meetings, and other neighborhood events.













- BBP mailed 50,000 bilingual postcards to community members.
- BBP used social media as a powerful tool to reach a wide audience with 5,000+ total engagements on posts and event boosts.
- BBP's Community Engagement Manager attends 30+ community events and meetings every month.
- From 2017 to 2019, BBP convened a Master Plan Steering Committee to advise on the Buffalo Bayou East's long term vision.
- Since 2019, BBP has gathered a East End/Fifth Ward Stakeholder Committee to provide input on its ongoing design efforts and a Good Neighbor Ambassador Committee to serve as a communication conduit to the community.

Summary of Agreement Projects


- Restored, expanded, and improved parkland (including Tony Marron & Japhet Creek Parks)
- New hike and bike trails along Buffalo Bayou from downtown trails to Lockwood Drive
- Two new trail bridges over Buffalo Bayou
 - Gregg Street connecting East River with South Bank Trails; Japhet Creek to Tony Marron Park connection
- A new Park Central Maintenance Facility
- New or enhanced public streets connecting to the Park
 - Marron Park Way; Lockwood Drive (to Harrisburg Blvd.); Navigation Greenway (Lockwood Dr. to Mack St.)
- New 80-unit multi-family development with 72 affordable units
- New Houston Public Library (HPL) facility at Turkey Bend
 - Hispanic History Research Center and an HPL Express
- Existing industrial space at Turkey Bend transformed into a vibrant, waterfront destination



Park Maintenance and Operations

- East River Trails and Gregg Street Bridge:
 - City through a partnership with East River-Midway and HCID #23
- All other areas of the Park
 - Maintenance and operations led by BBP
 - Annual Park greenspace maintenance and operations funding:
 - Estimated \$1.3 Million annual payment at completion of Park development phase:
 - 50% BPP
 - 50% City and County (25% each)
 - Scheduled "ramp up" of annual payment as projects are completed
 - City and County funding though TIRZs 18 and 23

Next Steps

- Commissioners Court consideration: September 27th
- City Council consideration: September 28th
 - Agreement Ordinance
 - Agreement-Related Ordinances:
 - 1. Street name change of unimproved Foley Street to Marron Park Way
 - 2. The Agreement
 - 3. Code changes to Chapters 32 and 26: Authorize BBP to operate and maintain City parkland in accordance with the Agreement
- Future City Council considerations:
 - TIRZs 18 and 23 budgets and related items
 - East River-Midway/HCID #23 related items
 - Appropriations of existing funding (CIP, real estate, Park Sector)
 - Real estate transactions
- Building on \$37 Million raised to date, continued BBP fundraising for the remaining \$46 Million needed for Agreement implementation.

Agreement Recap

- \$310 Million of total investment over 10-year development phase
- \$178.5 Million for Parks Projects \$100 Million Kinder Foundation gift
- Funding from City and its partners:
 - Park Projects: \$36.7 Million
 - Non-Park Projects: \$46.8 Million
 - East River Trails and Gregg Street Bridge maintenance (East River-Midway/HCID #23)
 - 25% of annual Park maintenance and operations funding: \$325,000 (TIRZs 18 and 23)
- No change to Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) or General Fund
 - Leverage existing City projects, plans, and partnerships; recent Council approvals
 - Future Council appropriations of existing CIP, real estate, CDBG-MIT, and Park Sector funding
 - Future Council actions related to TIRZs 18 and 23; East River-Midway/HCID #23
- City and County making similar contributions to Park Projects
