



NHHIP – STATUS UPDATE

- Voluntary Resolution Agreement (VRA) with FHWA
 - March 5, 2023
- Memorandum of Understanding with Harris County resolving NEPA lawsuit
 - December 22, 2022
 - Lawsuit was dismissed January 2023
- Memorandum of Understanding with the City of Houston
 - December 19, 2022
- NHHIP remains funded in the 2023 UTP with \$5 billion
 - Including \$490.7M as approved by the TPC





WHAT IS THE VRA?

- The Voluntary Resolution Agreement (VRA) is an understanding by and • between the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT)
- Resolves the FHWA investigation of TxDOT regarding the North Houston • Highway Improvement Project (Project) under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Title VI) by setting forth specific mitigation actions for the Project

Lifts pause •

- No Title VI violations identified in VRA
- TxDOT to resume all project development activities. ٠
- Provides specific, enforceable timelines and monitoring by FHWA to ensure • TxDOT carries out the Project consistent with the requirements of Title VI
- FHWA has concluded review of TxDOT's responsibilities under • the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) also with no findings

- Meaningful Access for Persons with Limited English Proficiency (LEP)









CRITICAL NEED IN THE GREATER HOUSTON REGION

I-45 was built more than 50 years ago, when the population in greater Houston region* was under 2 million.

Since 1970, this region's population has grown by more than 200% (current population nearly 7 million).

By 2050, the current population of this region is expected to almost double to nearly **13** million.

DECEMBER 2023 PUBLIC MEETING SERIES CHANGES FOR THE BETTER

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) invites you to the I-45 NHHIP "Changes for The Better" public meeting series. The purpose of these public meetings is for TxDOT to update the public on overall project status, design refinements, details regarding the Voluntary Resolution Agreement (VRA) and future construction schedule in an open house format. The public meeting series includes two public meetings for each of the three segments (in-person and a live virtual meeting). Please note that both the virtual and in-person public meetings will be conducted in English with real-time Spanish translation.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project limits are I-45 from US 59/I-69 to Beltway 8 North, including improvements on US 59/I-69 between I-45 and Spur 527 in Harris County. Texas. The Segment 3 public meeting will also present proposed design changes specific to the Segment 3B re-evaluation. Segment 3B limits are US 59/I-69 from State Highway (SH) 288 to I-45.
