


For Every Child, A Child Friendly City

The City of Houston has embarked upon a two-year process toward recognition as a UNICEF Child Friendly City. The Child-Friendly Cities Initiative (CFCI) was launched in 1996 by UNICEF to respond to the challenge of realizing the rights of children and now it operates in more than 3,000 cities and 57 countries. Houston has joined San Francisco and Minneapolis as the first cohort of U.S. cities to implement the CFCI.

The CFCI seeks to create and implement a holistic, data and outcomes driven, partnership-based action plan that secures and protects the rights of all children. In addition, the CFCI elevates the voices of youth in local governance and decision-making.

- 3 The right to essential services
- 4 The right to be safe
- 5 The right to family time, play, and leisure



CFCI is not a politically based program

CFCI is not tied to any political party, allowing anyone to appreciate and accept the program. It is a designation and a framework for Houston to be child friendly.



CFCI seeks collaboration and support

CFCI seeks to build a collaborative of businesses and political leaders who will pledge to child friendliness. The bigger the collaborative, the greater CFCI's impact.



CFCI follows global guidelines and principles

CFCI follows the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. The universality of the Rights of the Child allow any and all civic-minded individuals and groups to support CFCI.

Status of CFCI

- CFCI has a large team of advisors made of 32+ community, nonprofit, and city leaders
- CFCI has 20+ active youth leaders serving as advisors/researchers
- The CFCI newsletter was launched in April 2021 and has over 275 subscribers
- 10+ CFCI community assessment workshops that have reached over 200 youth and service providers
