His wood-and-steel sculptures are in many major art museums throughout the country, including the Smithsonian American Art Museum, Museum of Modern Art, Albright Knox, Los Angeles County Museum of Art, Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, Stedelijk Museum Amsterdam, and the Whitney Museum of American Art. Surls has been the recipient of an NEA Grant, *Texas Artist of the Year* (1991), and was given the *Living Legend Award* by

the Dallas Visual Art Center in 1993.
