100 Trees To Be Planted At RE-Plant Kingwood Kickoff *KBR, Kingwood Medical Center, Trees for Houston Partner For Tree Planting Event*

The Houston Parks and Recreation Department in partnership with Council Member Michael Sullivan-District E, Trees for Houston, KBR, and Kingwood Medical Center and volunteers will be replanting Kingwood Drive esplanades on Saturday, March 31st at 9:00 am. The RE-Plant Kingwood Drive esplanades effort has been made possible with donations from Trees for Houston, KBR, and Kingwood Medical Center.

"The drought has taken quite a toll in Kingwood. The city removed almost 2,000 trees from city rights of away. The generosity of these corporations will be appreciated for years to come," said City Council Member Mike Sullivan, District E.

RE-Plant Kingwood partners and volunteers will be planting 100 15 - gallon trees as part of a multi-year effort called Re-Plant Houston dedicated to reforesting Houston parks and esplanades devastated by the 2011 drought.

"We are thankful to KBR, Kingwood Medical Center, Trees for Houston and Council Member Sullivan for their commitment to Kingwood and the reforestation of the Kingwood Drive esplanades," said Joe Turner, Director Houston Parks and Recreation Department. "We continue to seek other sponsors and business who are interested in being a part of the RE-Plant Houston effort.

Trees to be planted in the RE-Plant Kingwood Drive esplanade event include: White Oak, Winged Elm, Bur Oak, Cedar Elm, Mexican Plum, Texas Redbud, and Loblolly Pine. Trees for Houston has committed to watering the new trees for the next two years.

Overall the Houston Parks and Recreation Department has removed approximately 19,000 hazardous trees from City of Houston parkland, esplanades and greenspaces (this includes the trees lost in Kingwood).
