8th Annual Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Tribute Planting Project

The Houston Parks and Recreation Department (H.P.A.R.D.), in partnership with the Houston Parks Board, will hold its 8th Annual Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Tribute Planting on Saturday, October 4, 2014. Saturday's planting project begins at 9:00 am. While all sites are available for photos the Gragg Park (2999 South Wayside parking lot off of Wheeler) site is scheduled to have the largest number of volunteers planting along 11 acres of Brays Bayou. Please be aware that this event will be completed at each site once all the seeds are dispersed and can end before the 10:00 a.m. scheduled end time.

Additional parks will be planted by H.P.A.R.D. personnel. Altogether, 45 acres of bayou, park, and greenspace land will have been planted during the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Tribute Planting Project.
