The Houston Parks and Recreation Department Opens New Nature Walk at Herman Brown Park

TheHouston Parks and Recreation Department will join U.S. Representative Gene Green and City Council Member RobertGallegos to cut the ribbon on the North Shore Community Nature Walk, a major new amenity at Herman Brown Park. Neighbors of the park, students from Furr High School, and members of the North Shore Community Fellowship of Faith Church will take part in the celebration and undertake volunteer projects at Saturday's event.

The North Shore Community Nature Walk at Herman Brown Park was made possible through a National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) "Parks Build Community" grant sponsored by ABC, ESPN, and Disney. The grant funding has been used to create a 0.5 mile trail with a shade area and seating. The trail is equipped with way-finding signs that highlight natural ecosystems, such as prairie and floodplain forests. To date, a variety of plants and animals from the area have been documented, including 20 species of birds and over 50 plant species.

The Houston Parks and Recreation Department (H.P.A.R.D.) stewards and manages over 37,859 acres of parkland and greenspace for the City of Houston and develops and implements recreational programming for citizens of all abilities.
