# City of Houston's 38<sup>th</sup> Annual Arbor Day Celebration Set for Wilson-Memorial Park

The Houston Parks & Recreation Department (HPARD), Apache Corporation, Accenture, and the Texas A&M Forest Service will join volunteers from across the city for the **38**<sup>th</sup> **Annual Arbor Day** tree planting celebration. The event will take place on **Saturday, January 27, 2024 from 8:30 a.m. to noon at Wilson-Memorial Park, 100 Gilpin, Houston 77034.** Following a 9 a.m. ceremony, partners and volunteers will plant and mulch 1,000 native trees throughout the park that were donated by Apache Corporation.

2024 marks the 38<sup>th</sup> consecutive year that the City of Houston will receive the designation of Tree City USA, granted by the Arbor Day Foundation for the city's commitment to the stewardship of its urban forest. Since 2021, the Houston Parks & Recreation Department, with partners' assistance, has planted over 22-thousand trees on public property.
