

DON'T BE A VICTIM OF ROAD RAGE

Everyone may lose their temper at one point or another on Houston roads, but it's important to remain calm and collected when operating a vehicle.

- Stay mindful of your surroundings.
- Always give yourself ample travel time.
- Drive respectfully and resist the urge to honk when other drivers aren't.
- If another driver gestures or exhibits threatening behavior, ignore them. Responding may escalate the situation.
- Drive to a police or fire station not your home – if a hostile driver follows you.
- Immediately call 911 if you believe you are in danger.



SURVIVING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Last year, three Houstonians lost their lives to domestic abuse every two weeks. HPD and our community partners stand ready to help anyone escape violence.

- Abusers may have patterns. Try to be aware of signs that violence is likely so you can assess the danger risk for you and your children.
- Leave a copy of important papers (birth certificates, passports, immigration papers, and Social Security cards) with a family member or neighbor, in case you have to leave in a hurry.
- If possible, always have a phone where you can get to it. Establish a code word with friends, family or neighbors to signal "Call the police. I need help."

PREVENTING VIOLENCE & FIREARM THEFT

It's important for everyone to be vigiliant in their efforts to protect themselves and their property.

- Stay aware of what is happening around you at the ATM machine. Don't count cash within view of others.
- Make good decisions about those with whom you associate and where you choose to hang out.
- De-escalate or walk away if you find yourself in a heated argument.
- Always park in well-lit areas and lock car doors. Never leave valuables inside. Firearms, packages, laptops, and purses are common targets for thieves.
- If you carry a firearm, invest in a gun safe for your vehicle. Leave your weapon at home if you are visiting establishments where they aren't allowed rather than leaving an unsecured gun in your car.
- Share these tips with teens and young adults in your life.
