



Community Engagement & Outreach Efforts 2022

In 2022, the Vision Zero Team engaged with more than 3,000 people in person. These activities included:

- Two Mayor's Special Events:
 - o Tour de Houston and,
 - o Mayor's Back to School Fest.
- Hosting the World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims in front of the City Hall.
- Hosting the Premier of the SIDETRACKED Documentary in collaboration with AAA and HPD. This documentary is focused on distracted driving, featuring a behind-the-scenes look at the challenges of law enforcement along with interviews with victims, behavioral experts, patrol officers, and others.
- Presenting the Vision Zero Program and Action Plan to Superneighborhoods, traffic safety agencies, consultants, and institutions.
- Accepting media interviews in English and Spanish (in person, for podcasts, and on radio).
- Supporting six Bike Rodeos and Bicycle Safety workshops around the city, in partnership with Harris County Health Department, Harris County Precinct 1, AAA, Texas Children's Hospital, Bike Houston, TxDOT, and Greater Northside Management District.
- Attending several Community Events including Bike to Work Day, Tour de Northside, four National Night Outs, Starry Night at the Chinese Community Center, Health and Educational Fairs at the Consulate of Mexico, Houston Public Library events, and others.
- Participating as guest speakers for the Vision Zero Texas Cities Summit.
- Supporting two Bike Lane Pop-Ups

Improving the Language

Status quo	Better practice	Effect of status quo
Accident: "Pedestrian killed in accident on Main Street."	Crash : "Pedestrian killed in <u>crash</u> on Main Street."	Obscures preventable nature of crashes
Non-agentive: "A pedestrian was hit and killed." (no agent)	Agentive: "A pedestrian was hit and killed by a car."	Obscures role of a human actor
Focus on pedestrian: "A pedestrian was hit and killed by a car."	Focus on vehicle: "A <u>car</u> hit and killed a pedestrian."	Increases blame for the focus of the sentence
Object-based language: "A car jumped the curb."	Person-based language: "A <u>driver</u> drove over the curb."	Obscures role of a human actor
Counterfactual statements: "The pedestrian darted into the street."	Not included	Increases perceived blame for the victim
Episodic framing : Treats the crash as an isolate incident.	Thematic framing: "This is the tenth fatal collision this year."	Prevents readers from connecting the dots between incidents and shifts attention to individuals.
